



We saw a significant improvement, up by 22 percent, in the total number of Band 5s achieved. The combined Band 5 and 6 total was also the highest in the past ten years, a fine achievement indeed.

Elearning at the Prep School

The boys continued to use iPads and laptops to investigate and create content showcasing their understanding of various science-based concepts.

Educational technologies played an important role in enabling students to explore these concepts while creating and designing solutions for different areas of need. For example, boys in Year 3 explored how

scientists use technology to look after the Great Barrier Reef and they even designed their own machines made from LEGO robotics for cleaning up the reef.

Students in Year 2 discovered how technology is changing the lives of people with prosthetics and created their own robotic arms using an Ultimaker 3D printing machine.

Year 5 Science students looked at electricity and energy, demonstrating their understanding of technology through designing an interactive diorama to share with the younger grades. The boys used the educational circuit kit Makey Makey and craft materials to create the physical model and used the programming tool Scratch to code the interactive elements.

Platforms that supported the boys' learning included Mathletics, LiteracyPlanet, Ziptales and BrainPOP. Seesaw and Stile helped strengthen the connection between home and school by allowing the boys to share their digital tasks, images and video footage of learning experiences.

Stutorials Tutoring Initiative

A wonderful initiative was developed by Scots Year 12 students. Academic Prefect, Jonathan Chandler, along with support from Thomas Chandler, Finlay Ferris and Marcus Nguyen, devised a peer tutoring program known as 'Stutorials'.

Held in the Ginahgulla Library, every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, from 3:15pm until 5:00pm, students in Years 11 and 12 work carefully with boys in Years 7 and 8. The goal was to support students in English, Mathematics and Science.

Boys work one on one, in pairs, or in small groups to receive explicit teaching support. The program reinforces learning and correcting misunderstandings.

Jonathan's vision was to support student learning and help raise the academic profile within the student

population. Students helping each other aligns with the College's Teaching for Character philosophy. It is hoped that students will strengthen their skills and understandings in these subject areas, hold an improved belief in their capabilities and form connections with students in different year groups.

The Indigenous Education Program

The families involved with the Indigenous Education Program have chosen The Scots College because they want the best education for their son/s.

With the support of the Australian Indigenous Education Foundation, The Waratah Project, Jumbunna Institute for Indigenous Education and the Research Department at the College, along with parent, carers and student feedback, the Indigenous Education Program is constantly evolving. This ensures that each boy in the Program is supported academically, pastorally, and culturally.

Education is the key. Scots is a leader in providing a world-class education and it is our aim that each boy who goes through the Indigenous Education Program will play a role in closing the gap of social and professional inequalities still apparent in Australia and provide stability for future generations.



On Monday 25 April, Senior Drum Major, Charles Sackar (Year 12) and Pipe Major, Sterling Nasa (Year 12), led the Full Highland band, for the 2022 Sydney Anzac Day March. A total of 120 Full Highland band boys marched with pride. We were overjoyed to have had a few of the Full Highland band boys from the Preparatory School join us.

In September, 50 Full Highland drummers performed the pre-game entertainment at the new Allianz Stadium for the Sydney Roosters versus South Sydney Rabbitohs NRL game. The boys showcased their talents to a sold-out stadium.

The annual Sydney Highland Gathering was hosted by the Pipes and Drums Support Group at the College on the Main Oval, Sunday 11 September. Bands from across NSW competed for the Ray Lee Memorial Trophy. Pipe Major, Oliver Rouse (Year 11), led the A band to victory and ensured the Ray Lee Memorial Trophy was retained by the College.

Congratulations to the two Year 12 boys, Jacob Caesar and Sterling Nasa, who played the bagpipes for their HSC Music Performance exams, performing wonderful pieces using backing instruments and creative musical arrangements.

Our Full Highland boys finished the year on an impressive high. In November, Pipes and Drums A band, and B band, were named NSW Pipe Band Champions in their competition categories at the State Pipe Band Championships. Then, the boys began preparing for their performances at the Tartan Day Parade in New York with 10,000 pipers and at The Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo in Edinburgh, in April and August 2023, respectively.

I chose a Jonathan Swift quote for my topic, "I have ever hated all nations, professions, and communities, and all my love is toward individuals." My speech, was well received by the audience, whereupon I discovered that all ten speakers before me had chosen the same stimulus, and that I was the first to choose a different topic.

Strong Young Voices

The number of Preparatory School boys taking part in Debating doubled in 2022, as we entered two competitions: the Independent Schools' Debating Association (ISDA) and the Sydney Schools Debating Developmental Competition (SSDDC).

The ISDA teams debated some of their opponents in person for the first time in two years. The SSDDC teams continued their debates via Zoom and won four debates. All Debating teams demonstrated mammoth growth across the season under the guidance of ISDA coach, Mr Christopher Richard, and SSDDC coach, Mr Connor Isaias-White. Both coaches were impressed

with the boys' abilities to form excellent rebuttals.

The A team made it to the Octofinals while the B team remained undefeated for most of the

competition and made it through to the quarterfinals, missing out on the next stage by a narrow margin on the topic: 'We should increase tax on junk food'.

Lighting, Exposure and Composition

The great American landscape photographer
Ansel Adams once said: "When words become unclear,
I shall focus with photographs."

At The Scots College there are many defining events that occur during a student's time at the Middle and Senior School campuses. These moments encapsulate the adventurous spirit, curiosity and pursuit of excellence Scots boys demonstrate as they navigate their journey through the Middle School and Senior School.

The purpose of Co-Curricular Photography is to capture these moments, applying highly-skilled camera techniques and artistic intuition to create powerful images. Developing the technical aptitude to achieve a commendable photograph relies on three elements: lighting, exposure and composition.

Students from Years 10 to 12 explored the mechanisms of how a DSLR camera operates and its application to manipulate movement and depth of field.

Topics included studies on aperture, framing and composition, studio lighting and photojournalism. A popular lesson undertaken by Year 10 students was the use of slow shutter speeds to produce light paintings.

In September, students entered images in the Woollahra Municipal Council 2022 Youth Photographic Award and Short Film Prize. Two Scots boys were awarded first prize for their exceptional images: Max Condous (Year 9) for his work, *Pipes* and Otto Atkinson (Year 7) for his work, *Pride of Tradition*. Charlie Edmondson (Year 10) also received the Highly Commended Short Film Prize. Ten high schools participated, with over 190 photos and short films entered, making this a wonderful result.

Congratulations to the College's AMEB Grade 8 performers: Martin Lo (Year 11), Ricky Wang (Year 9), Ethan Yu (Year 7), Albert Zhong (Year 8) and Lucas Zhu (Year 9). We also celebrated with Owen Gao (Year 9) when he completed his AMusA diploma on the flute this year.

Musical Success in Eisteddfods and Festivals

The College's musical ensembles also won acclaim at eisteddfods and festivals this year. Of note was the Senior Highlanders Vocal Ensemble winning through to the finals of the Sydney Eisteddfod Australasian Open Choral Championships alongside open-age choirs from around Australia and New Zealand. Other results included Chamber Strings being highly commended, Impulse! Jazz Combo and Percussion Ensemble achieving third place, and both The Roar and The Senior Highlanders Vocal Ensembles

being placed second in their respective events.
